Deer in Bent Oaks

The neighborhood white tail deer population has grown over the last several years as their habitat condensed with surrounding development. Bent Oaks has abundant acorns, which is their favorite food. Properties with wooded backyards adjacent to Little Shoal Creek tributary are ideal for them and our irrigated gardens provide succulent grazing in spring, summer and fall. As deer do not have upper incisors, jagged cuts on plant stems and leaves are evidenced. In winter, food is scarcer and grazing on young twigs and conifers is evidenced by thin foliage below 5'. In fall, young bucks rub their itchy antlers on young trees 1 to 4" caliper to mark their territory and shredded bark 2-3' off the ground is visible. As they often return to their favorite tree, the tree can be girdled and be weakened or die.

The best strategies in suburban lots are to avoid planting deer's favorite plants, surround plantings with plants with strong scents that they dislike and use deterrents often and interchangeably.

Avoid planting these favorite deer plants:

CrocusImpatiensYewsTulipsDahliasArborvitaeHostasRosesMugo pineLiliesHydrangeasWhite PineSedumsAzaleasDogwood

Daylilies Rhododendrons

These strongly scented plants can, to some degree, deter deer if grown amongst other plants:

Catmint Lavender Thyme

Chives Mint(invasive)

Garlic Sage

Taste or smell deer deterrents are can be helpful. Deer can become accustomed to them so they should be changed periodically and they need to be reapplied after each rain. Used consistently they can minimize damage. Some deterrents reported to be most effective are 6.2 % hot sauce, Liquid Fence, Plantskydd, Deer-Away, coyote urine and bobcat urine.
